

Travelin' Tony's Timetables by Tony Fabro, N8RRB

Elsewhere in this newsletter you'll see announcements about the upcoming CORC Potluck on June 10th. If CORC's membership participation is like other organizations, less than half of you reading this have ever been to a potluck. So this article is intended for those of you who have never been to a CORC potluck. We'll go through the Who, What, Where, Why and When of it.

Who: <u>All</u> amateur radio operators (CORC members and non-members), and prospective amateur radio operators are welcome. In addition to our membership, every so often we get people learning about the hobby show up to see what this 'ham radio thing' is all about!

What: The event consists usually of three phases. First, we eat! It's a potluck, so that means you need to bring something to share. Crock-pot meals and casseroles are potluck staples. If you aren't good at cooking, let someone else do the cooking (think Boston Market, Subway, KFC, etc. [Editor's Note: What about White Castle?]. Veggie trays and desserts are also good options.

Next we have a presentation/discussion about some topic related to amateur radio. At our upcoming meeting we will have professional representatives talking about weather and weather spotting. Sometimes we have technical discussions about antennas, antenna building, radio modes, etc.. The speakers are always interesting and informative.

During the winter potluck, we substitute having a speaker with our annual business meeting, along with a complete overview of club operations so that you can see how your dues are being spent.

Lastly, we usually have some give-a-ways and/or drawings for those in attendance. You have a chance to win something by just showing up!

Where: Genoa Township Hall on old Rt. 3 a few miles north of Westerville.

Why: While CORC focuses much of its time and effort in maintaining repeaters, the board feels it is important to promote the social aspects of amateur radio. Hams like to talk (I don't think I've ever met one that doesn't!), so why not get together in person to chat. The potlucks provide an opportunity to have an "eyeball QSO" with local hams, as well as to meet with the club leadership.

When: The club aims to have three potlucks a year (fall, winter and late spring). As mentioned earlier, the winter potluck doubles as the club's annual meeting where the election of directors occurs.

Bottom line is that the potlucks are meant to engage the membership, provide an opportunity to meet other hams, learn more about the hobby, and have some fun as well. Director's Biography by Rick Tressler, WA3U00

I was first licensed in the fall of 1973 as WN3UOO. My Novice Code and written exams were administered by local ham and 'Elmer' Ernie WA3EHK, now SK. I was 16 years old at the time. A couple of years later I took the General and passed the code without trouble but I had not studied enough to pass the written. I took care of the studying problem. Then I went back a couple of months later and took my General written again with no problems. I had a great tutor, Ron W3HXO also now SK. Both of these fellow hams had a lot to do with me getting into and then staying in ham radio. I've been continuously licensed ever since having held AA8VQ and K8SV call signs after moving to Columbus in the summer of 1991. A few years ago, I decided I wanted my old Region 3 call back and applied for it as a vanity call. I was sure I would get it. No more call sign changes.



I started as an electrician's helper in 1975 a year after high school graduation at a factory in my hometown of Baltimore MD. I worked 'up the ladder' for 10 years, and as I like to say, "I pulled wire and bent pipe". In addition, I did troubleshooting and worked on repairing many types of electrical and process control systems. Beginning in 1985, I've spent most of my career working with large standby DC power systems, UPS and battery systems. I've worked as a field tech, technical trainer and technical support engineer for Liebert here in Columbus after starting

with them back in Baltimore. I've worked for Liebert or one of their divisions for more than 30 years. On December 30, 2016 I quit corporate life and started out on my own as an independent consultant working in my field of expertise. I haven't looked back since.

In my free time, I enjoy operating UHF/VHF analog as well as DMR. I can be found on the Ohio DMR Talk Group. When I get more time in the winter months, I work HF digital modes and SSB. My QRZ.com page has the station layout and full description for those interested. I also enjoy going to hamfests. I designed and built my own DC power system for the shack, as just about everything runs on 12V except the HF amp. Maybe I need a solid state amp?

My other interests include R/C model aviation, bicycling and working around the house on various projects with my wife Maggie. We've been together for 26 years. Our dog Lily rounds out the family.

Ohio ARES SEC News by Stan Broadway, N8BHL- Section Emergency Coordinator

On April 28, Ohio ARES staged its latest "NVIS Antenna Day" to build, test, and use antennas designed for local communication- within an approximate 400 mile circle. The Ohio EOC station, The "Sarge" (W8SGT) was on the air and connected with 56 stations, almost all on 80 meters. Contacts were made with all four corners of the state, the eastern counties and western counties. It was proof we can maintain emergency communication across the state if needed!

Ohio ARES has adopted the national league's three-tiered membership classifications. Level 1 is for the "rookie" operator, or those not trained in NIMS. We sincerely value their time for public service events! Level 2 is for those trained in the four "magic" NIMS courses (100, 200, 700, 800). These operators will be on the county activation list to respond when ARES is requested. Level 3 is a new level, designed for upper management or those with higher training to include NIMS 300-400, COML, COMT, and other such certifications. You do not have to be a county EC to rise to level 3.

The ARRL has notified us that the online college which hosted the EC-01 course is shutting down- so the course will not be available at all. The league is in the process of re-writing that course anyway, so it's best just to wait and see how that all works out.

Ohio ARES will use the DMR "Ohio Channel" 3139 as our official talk group. When activations are requested, we plan to announce that and other information over 3139, so make sure it's in your scanning!


